Important Happenings at HMTCA

HMTCA STUDENTS PARTICIPATE IN MASS CASUALTY DRILL

HMTCA students were among the participants in the October 10, 2013 mass casualty incident drill, coordinated by Connecticut Children's Medical Center. This is the second year HMTCA has had the honor to participate in this exercise.

CCMC staff and Public Safety Agencies conducted the emergency preparedness event. Roles were prepared for this exercise, in which HMTCA students, role playing the victims, were classified as critical, medium, and low need, based on their "injuries." Emergency and hospital personnel provided "aid," based on the students' level of need.

This was a fantastic service learning opportunity for our students, who earned three hours for their participation. The experience provided them with insight into what emergency personnel and first responders must do in the face of a disaster, and what they should do in such an event.

BRUSHING UP ON OUR SHAKESPEARE


High school students attended two of The Bard's most famous plays this month. The junior curriculum came alive on September 10th for sixty students who went to Hartford Stage to see "Macbeth" as part of InterAct, a program sponsored by Hartford Stage and funded by local businesses. One of our sophomores was sitting so close to the action that she returned with a prop, a letter that had been tossed aside by an actor during one of the opening scenes. Talk about a performance to remember! These lucky high schoolers will attend a total of three performances this school year--"A Christmas Carol" in December and the premier of "Somewhere" in April--and will participate in pre-performance and post-performance workshops conducted for each show by professional teaching artists.

The following week, over fifty juniors went to Playhouse on Park to experience firsthand the treachery and deceit of "Othello." They returned to school that afternoon with great tales of characterization and universal themes, and assurances of how mature they were during the love scene. We later received an email from the coordinator of student services at Playhouse, expressing her appreciation of our students' decorum. Like their peers who were exemplars of appropriate theater etiquette at "Macbeth," they made us proud!

HMTCA Human Rights Class Attends Trinity Lecture

The dream of having HMTCA students actively engaged in the academic rigor at Trinity College is becoming a reality. On Thursday, October 10th students from Ms. Avery's high school class on Human Rights attended a lunchtime lecture given by Paulo Abrão. Dr. Abrão is the Brazilian National Secretary of Justice and the President of the Brazilian Amnesty Commission. Students applied their Spanish language skills as they listened to Dr. Abrão, in his native Portuguese, discuss human rights reform. The lecture hall was packed with Trinity students and staff as Dr. Abrão described his work in human rights and the democratization processes. HMTCA students enjoyed the atmosphere and the intellectual challenge of 'thinking and acting' like a college student. One student, Ervin Mahlukati, mentioned that he has already purchased his tickets to the World Cup in Brazil this summer so he was particularly interested in Dr. Abrão's comments about safety and security for the event.

The second event is another **Trinity College football game** on Saturday, November 9th at 12:00 noon, on the Trinity campus.


Theatre Auditions

Book Reviews by Bengiovanni



Each issue our library media specialist Mr. Bengiovanni will review books from the HMTCA library. This week, he received some help.

This book review is from the Smart Cookies, an HMTCA student book club.

Love Among the Walnuts by Jean Ferris

Summary by Isabelle Galm: "Horatio Alger Huntington-Ackerman--who is the richest man in the world--is married to Mousey Hunter- Ackerman. Their butler, Bently, is married to Flossie. They all live in a mansion out in the country next to the mysterious Walnut Manor. When Horatio, Mousey, and Flossie fall into comas due to a poisoned birthday cake, (supplied by Horatio's evil brothers Bart and Bernie, who are after Horatio to kill him so they can inherit Horatio's grand fortune) it is up to Sandy (Horatio and Mousey's son) and Bently to wake up the sleepers, and possibly help a couple of people on the way."

Review by Smart Cookies: This was our first book in our book club. Our book club reviews of the book were mostly around 3 ½ stars out of 5. Izzy G. liked the fact the story was separated into parts. While Miette-Blue felt that the events occurred too randomly. Milanna S. agreed, and said there was too much happening in each chapter. Lola K., the book's toughest critic felt this book could have been better if it had more suspense. The book was enjoyed most by Eva H who liked the book "because it was quirky and funny, especially when Sunnie arrives and they move to Walnut Manor." Overall most of us liked the book.

The Maze of Bones, Book One of the 39 Clues Series

Summary from Goodreads.com: "Minutes before she died Grace Cahill changed her will, leaving her descendants an impossible decision: You have a choice - one million dollars or a clue. Grace is the last matriarch of the Cahills, the world's most powerful family. Everyone from Napoleon to Houdini is related to the Cahills, yet the source of the family power is lost. 39 clues hidden around the world will reveal the family's secret, but no one has been able to assemble them. Now the clues race is on, and young Amy and Dan must decide what's important: hunting clues or uncovering what REALLY happened to their parents."

Review from Mr. Bengiovanni: "The 39 Clues Series has a few gimmicks. First, it has seven different authors throughout the series (a shelving nightmare), and Secondly it has trading cards and prizes as readers are also part of the contest. Those detractions aside, the first book of the series is a well written (Rick Riordan of Lightning Thief fame) adventure where your typical team of a boy and a girl are on a dangerous quest. It is fairly fast paced and the chapters come quickly. The first book comes in at only 200 pages and is the largest book, so young readers will not feel overwhelmed with any single book, and can also feel progress as they move from book to book. I recommend this series to fans of Harry Potter or the Heroes of Olympus or if you enjoyed the National Treasure Movies. The 39 Clues series is available in the HMTCA Library Media Center in its own section instead of being shelved by author ☺"
